Reflecting on Living the Gospel

This Sunday's gospel begins with apostles seeking glory; they had yet to learn what being a follower of Jesus truly entails. There is more demand to being disciples than would appear, and finally facing that true glory is not found where we usually seek it. We receive true glory when we finally give up pursuing it and instead follow Jesus and the demanding life he offers. Why did the apostles follow Jesus? The gospel suggests they had reward on their minds: the glory of sitting at the right and left of Jesus in positions of honor. It took the apostles a long time to learn that the real reward of following Jesus would be to "drink the cup" and "be baptized" with his baptism. His baptism was his lifelong choice to do the will of the Father no matter what the cost. The cost would be humbly serving others to the point even of giving his life "for many." As Jesus' followers, we can choose no less. Like the apostles, it takes us no less time to learn this.

Much of our serving others is simply part of our everyday circumstances, for example, parents taking care of their children or a worker cooperating with others on a team job. Being the servant of all isn't always something extra or big; most of the time it is simply doing our everyday tasks generously and with integrity while keeping in mind that others are the Body of Christ and to serve them is to serve Christ. If we can do these everyday tasks with loving care, then when something big comes along we won't deny Jesus like the apostles, but will say "we can." And mean it, knowing full well the demands that identity with Christ entails.

Closing Prayers

May we be servant of all as we choose daily to follow Christ.

May we embrace Jesus' life of self-giving, each day learning more clearly what this means.

For Reflection:

- The glory I often discover myself seeking is . . . The glory Jesus invites me to seek is . . .
- The "cup" Jesus asks me to drink is . . . When I drink of this cup, I . . .

Suggestions for group and individual use:

1. Pray aloud the opening prayer (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect");
2. One person read aloud the gospel;
3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer;
4. Share together responses to "For Reflection";
5. Pray the "Closing Prayers."

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Gospel Mark 10:35-45 (longer form)

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Jesus and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." He replied, "What do you wish me to do for you?"

They answered him, "Grant that in your glory we may sit one at your right and the other at your left."

Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking.

Can you drink the cup that I drink or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?"

They said to him, "We can."

Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink, you will drink, and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right or at my left is not mine to give but is for those for whom it has been prepared."

When the ten heard this, they became indignant at James and John.

One Faith One Hope One Love Campaign Update

As you know, our parish has been actively participating in the *One Faith, One Hope, One Love* campaign!

I'd like to focus your attention on another need the campaign will address:

Catholic Charities and Social Services.....\$10,000,000

As an expression of our faith, we serve the poor and vulnerable through two agencies: *Catholic Charities of Southwestern Ohio* and *Catholic Social Services of the Miami Valley*. The 131,000 people we serve annually include many who are out of work for the first time, families with young children, older adults, caregivers, refugees/immigrants, at-risk youth, women in crisis pregnancies, and those who benefit from mental health counseling. We deliver food to provide five million meals annually through food banks, pantries and soup kitchens. The need is very real and growing, and service is provided without regard to religion, race, or age.

One Faith, One Hope, One Love provides an opportunity for our local Church to lift many who struggle from sliding further into poverty. Through increasing services provided and enabling a higher level of quality service we will:

- Provide specific programming to parishes and the community to reach 25,000 people with the Gospel message to serve the poor.
- Expand care management and enable 32,000 more families to improve their life situations.
- Develop self-sufficiency through job readiness, literacy, healthy choices, GED, financial skills, and legal services (97,500 services).
- Invest further in parish/community food pantries, nutrition programs, and the Second Harvest Food Bank to deliver an additional 7.5 million meals to reduce hunger.
- Increase volunteer hours by 128,000 through professional management and technology.
- Increase effectiveness through technology and facility upgrades to serve 67,000 more individuals.

During the next few weeks, each household in the parish will be receiving more information about the *One Faith, One Hope, One Love* campaign through the mail and at mass.

Thank you to everyone who is helping to make this campaign a reality with your generous gifts of time, talent, and treasure.
